THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

Made available \$139.1 million to Michigan to invest in home and community-based services to expand access to care for seniors and people with disabilities and raise wages for workers.¹



Vaccinations

Over 87% of all Michigan seniors are vaccinated, better protecting them from COVID-19.²



Protection for Residents

Made available \$14.1 million to help protect nursing home residents from COVID-19.³



Senior & Caregiver Services

Provided a \$20.2 million investment to support older adults and family caregivers in Michigan.⁴



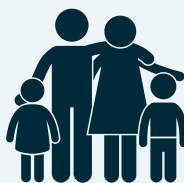
Food Security

Secured a \$23.5 million investment to provide nutritious meals to seniors in Michigan.⁵



Combating Elder Abuse

Allocated landmark funding to better protect the one in ten older Americans who experience a form of elder abuse in a given year.⁶



Help for Grandfamilies

Established a National Technical Assistance Center to help the more than 54,000 grandfamilies raising grandchildren in Michigan.⁷

THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT



High-speed Internet

Will help the more than 378,000 Michigan households with at least one senior that report no internet access to obtain high-speed internet.⁸



Mass Transit

Will improve transit and make it more accessible for the more than 1.4 million individuals with disabilities in Michigan⁹ through an investment of at least \$1 billion.¹⁰

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
