THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

Made available \$488.6 million to Minnesota to invest in home and community-based services to expand access to care for seniors and people with disabilities and raise wages for workers.¹



Vaccinations

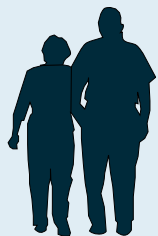


95% of all Minnesota seniors are vaccinated, better protecting them from COVID-19.²



Protection for Residents

Made available \$10.7 million to help protect nursing home residents from COVID-19.³



Senior & Caregiver Services

Provided a \$10.6 million investment to support older adults and family caregivers in Minnesota.⁴



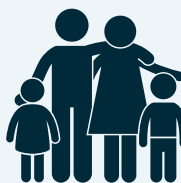
Food Security

Secured a 12.3 million investment to provide nutritious meals to seniors in Minnesota.⁵



Combating Elder Abuse

Allocated landmark funding to better protect the one in ten older Americans who experience a form of elder abuse in a given year.⁶



Help for Grandfamilies

Established a National Technical Assistance Center to help the more than 18,000 grandfamilies raising grandchildren in Minnesota.⁷

THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT



High-speed Internet

Will help the more than 165,000 Minnesota households with at least one senior that report no internet access to obtain high-speed internet.⁸



Mass Transit

Will improve transit and make it more accessible for the more than 603,000 individuals with disabilities in Minnesota through an investment of at least \$856 million.^{9,10}

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
