THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

Made available \$182.3 million to North Carolina to invest in home and community-based services to expand access to care for seniors and people with disabilities and raise wages for workers.¹



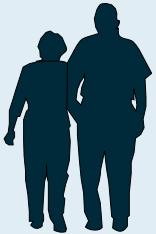
Vaccinations

Over 85% of all North Carolina seniors are vaccinated, better protecting them from COVID-19.²



Protection for Residents

Made available \$14.1 million to help protect nursing home residents from COVID-19.³



Senior & Caregiver Services

Provided a \$19.9 million investment to support older adults and family caregivers in North Carolina.⁴



Food Security

Secured a \$23.1 million investment to provide nutritious meals to seniors in North Carolina.⁵



Combating Elder Abuse

Allocated landmark funding to better protect the one in ten older Americans who experience a form of elder abuse in a given year.⁶



Help for Grandfamilies

Established a National Technical Assistance Center to help the more than 85,000 grandfamilies raising grandchildren in North Carolina.⁷

THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT



High-speed Internet

Will help the more than 416,000 North Carolina households with at least one senior that report no internet access to obtain high-speed internet.⁸



Mass Transit

Will improve transit and make it more accessible for the more than 1.3 million individuals with disabilities in North Carolina⁹ through an investment of at least \$920 million.¹⁰
