THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

Made available \$66 million to Oklahoma to invest in home and community-based services to expand access to care for seniors and people with disabilities and raise wages for workers.¹



Vaccinations

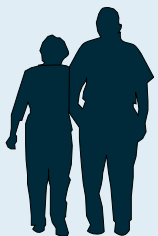


Over 85% of all Oklahoma seniors are vaccinated, better protecting them from COVID-19.²



Protection for Residents

Made available \$9.1 million to help protect nursing home residents from COVID-19.³



Senior & Caregiver Services

Provided a \$7.2 million investment to support older adults and family caregivers in Oklahoma.⁴



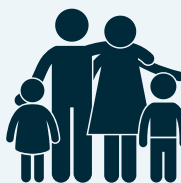
Food Security

Secured a \$8.3 million investment to provide nutritious meals to seniors in Oklahoma.⁵



Combating Elder Abuse

Allocated landmark funding to better protect the one in ten older Americans who experience a form of elder abuse in a given year.⁶



Help for Grandfamilies

Established a National Technical Assistance Center to help the more than 43,000 grandfamilies raising grandchildren in Oklahoma.⁷

THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT

High-speed Internet



Will help the more than 173,000 Oklahoma households with at least one senior that report no internet access to obtain high-speed internet.⁸



Mass Transit

Will improve transit and make it more accessible for the more than 613,000 individuals with disabilities in Oklahoma through an investment of at least \$352 million.¹⁰
