The Inflation Reduction Act will reduce health care and prescription drug costs for California seniors, people with disabilities and families.



Making Approved Vaccines Free Starting in 2023 Ensures approved vaccines under

Medicare Part D are free, helping nearly 462,000 Californians.¹



Lowering Insulin Copays Starting in 2023 Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum

of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for over 161,500 Californians.²



Reducing Health Care Premiums Starting in 2023 Lowers Marketplace premiums for roughly 1.6 million Californians by hundreds of dollars per person, on average, in 2023.³

Helping Low-Income Americans Starting in 2024

Increases financial assistance to over 24,000 low-income Californians to help them afford their prescription medications.⁴

Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for over 5.3 million Californians with Medicare Part D⁵− giving the nearly 115,000 Californians who will exceed this limit the help they need.⁶

Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation

Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.⁷



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
