Making Approved Vaccines Free Starting in 2023

Ensures approved vaccines under Medicare Part D are free, helping nearly 22,400 Hawai'i residents.¹



Lowering Insulin Copays Starting in 2023

Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for nearly 6,500 Hawai'i residents.²



Reducing Health Care Premiums Starting in 2023 Lowers Marketplace premiums for roughly 20,000 Hawai'i residents by hundreds of dollars per person, on average, in 2023.³

Helping Low-Income Americans Starting in 2024

Increases financial assistance to over 1,300 low-income Hawai'i residents to help them afford their prescription medications.⁴

Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for over 213,300 Hawai'i residents with Medicare Part D⁵ – giving the nearly 3,700 Hawai'i residents who will exceed this limit the help they need.⁶

Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation

Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.⁷



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
