## Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs

Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for over 412,400 Nevadans with Medicare Part D <sup>5</sup>– giving the more than 11,500 Nevadans who will exceed this limit the help they need.<sup>6</sup>

### Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.<sup>7</sup>



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
