Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for nearly 45,400 New Jerseyans.²

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for nearly 1.3 million New Jerseyans with Medicare Part D⁵− giving the more than 45,500 New Jerseyans who will exceed this limit the help they need.⁶

Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.⁷



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
