### Making Approved Vaccines Free Starting in 2023



Ensures approved vaccines under Medicare Part D are free, helping over 140,800 North Carolinians.<sup>1</sup>



#### Lowering Insulin Copays Starting in 2023

Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for over 59,100 North Carolinians.<sup>2</sup>

#### Reducing Health Care Premiums Starting in 2023

Lowers Marketplace premiums for roughly 637,000 North Carolinians by hundreds of dollars per person, on average, in 2023.<sup>3</sup>



#### Helping Low-Income Americans Starting in 2024

Increases financial assistance to nearly 22,900 low-income North Carolinians to help them afford their prescription medications.<sup>4</sup>



### Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs

Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for over 1.6 million North Carolinians with Medicare Part D<sup>5</sup>– giving the nearly 51,000 North Carolinians who will exceed this limit the help they need.<sup>6</sup>



## Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.



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
