The Devastating Consequences of Medicaid Cuts

More than 145,600 South Dakotans rely on Medicaid & CHIP¹

Cuts to Medicaid would disproportionately hurt children, older adults, people with disabilities, and people of color by eliminating their health care access and coverage.



Cutting Care for Children

89% of eligible children in South Dakota are supported by Medicaid and/or CHIP.² Cuts would disproportionately hurt children with the lowest incomes and the highest health care needs.³



Increasing Disparities for Communities of Color Medicaid covers 47% of adults of color in South Dakota ages 18-65.⁵ A decrease in Medicaid funding would directly impact access to the communities that need it the most.



Cuts to Medicare Beneficiaries

Cuts to Medicaid could impact more than 21,500 dually-eligible South Dakotans who rely on the program to help pay their Medicare premiums and co-pays.⁷



Blocking Access for Pregnant Women and Newborns

Nearly 3,200 births (28%) in South Dakota per year are covered by Medicaid. A cut to Medicaid would prevent mothers from obtaining the care they need.⁴



Curbing Health Care Access for People with Disabilities

Medicaid covers 45% of nonelderly adults with disabilities nationwide, roughly 10 million people.⁶ They depend on Medicaid for services in order to thrive in their communities.



Disrupting Nursing Home Care

Cuts to Medicaid could disrupt care for 53% of nursing home residents in South Dakota who use Medicaid as their primary payer to stay in a nursing facility.⁸



Threatening Financial Stability of Community Hospitals

Any cut to Medicaid could decrease reimbursement for the 57 community hospitals in South Dakota, which could create uncertainty for the financial sustainability of the hospitals that are critical care access points and job creators in their local areas.⁹



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
