Making Approved Vaccines Free Starting in 2023



Ensures approved vaccines under Medicare Part D are free, helping over 30,300 Utahns.¹



Lowering Insulin Copays Starting in 2023

Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for nearly 13,100 Utahns.²

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Reducing Health Care Premiums Starting in 2023

Lowers Marketplace premiums for roughly 245,000 Utahns by hundreds of dollars per person, on average, in 2023.³



Helping Low-Income Americans Starting in 2024

Increases financial assistance to over 2,500 low-income Utahns to help them afford their prescription medications.⁴



Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs

Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for nearly 318,200 Utahns with Medicare Part D⁵− giving the more than 11,100 Utahns who will exceed this limit the help they need. 6



Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.



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
