Making Approved Vaccines Free Starting in 2023 Ensures approved vaccines under

Lowering Insulin Copays Starting in 2023

Reduces Medicare copays to a maximum of \$35 per month, lowering insulin costs for over 35,300 Wisconsinites.²



Reducing Health Care Premiums Starting in 2023 Lowers Marketplace premiums for roughly 193,000 Wisconsinites by hundreds of dollars per person, on average, in 2023.³

Helping Low-Income Americans Starting in 2024

Increases financial assistance to over 3,800 low-income Wisconsinites to help them afford their prescription medications.⁴



Capping Out-of-Pocket Costs Starting in 2025

Caps prescription drug costs at \$2,000 a year for nearly 936,000 Wisconsinites with Medicare Part D⁵– giving the more than 29,600 Wisconsinites who will exceed this limit the help they need.⁶

Lowering Prescription Drug Prices Through Negotiation Starting in 2026

Beginning in 2026, Medicare-negotiated prescription drug prices will go into effect, reducing costs for certain high-cost drugs and out-of-pocket costs for seniors and people with disabilities.⁷





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
