THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT

Made available \$253 million to Washington to invest in home and community-based services to expand access to care for seniors and people with disabilities and raise wages for workers.¹



Vaccinations

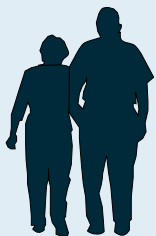


Over 93% of all Washington seniors are vaccinated, better protecting them from COVID-19.²



Protection for Residents

Made available \$7.6 million to help protect nursing home residents from COVID-19.³



Senior & Caregiver Services

Provided a \$13.8 million investment to support older adults and family caregivers in Washington.⁴



Food Security

Secured a \$16.1 million investment to provide nutritious meals to seniors in Washington.⁵



Combating Elder Abuse

Allocated landmark funding to better protect the one in ten older Americans who experience a form of elder abuse in a given year.⁶



Help for Grandfamilies

Established a National Technical Assistance Center to help the more than 39,000 grandfamilies raising grandchildren in Washington.⁷

THE INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENT AND JOBS ACT

High-speed Internet



Will help the more than 152,000 Washington households with at least one senior that report no internet access to obtain high-speed internet.⁸



Mass Transit

Will improve transit and make it more accessible for the more than 958,000 individuals with disabilities in Washington through an investment of at least \$1.9 billion.¹⁰

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
